## **Artist Robert Vargas Marks First Anniversary of Ohtani Mural**



As artist Robert Vargas (standing, center) joins friends, family, and fellow Dodger fans in celebrating the first anniversary of his 11-story mural, a community reflects on the behind-the-scenes drama that almost killed his dream.

In January 2024, Vargas appeared before about 25 members of the Little Tokyo Community Council to share his vision for a giant mural featuring baseball phenom Shohei Ohtani, who had just signed with the Dodgers. He proudly presented his drawing, but the reaction from the meeting attendees, about 25 or so, was disappointing, Some accused him of cultural appropriation and suggested that he replace the image of Mount Fuji with cherry blossoms. The Mayor's office jumped and tried to stop the mural two days before it was to be unveiled. Fortunately, with support from the Miyako Hotel management, former Councilmember de Leon, LTBA, and the business community, Vargas completed the mural, which he named, "LA Rising."

# Little Tokyo Selected for Smart Toilet Pilot

The lack of public restrooms along transit systems in the U.S. has long been a rider complaint, particularly on Metro's rail and busway system, which covers 100+ miles and has some lengthy bus and rail trips.

To address the challenges of both funding restrooms and keeping them clean and safe, Metro launched a partnership with Throne Labs, a company that makes self-contained, portable restrooms. The Regional Connector station was among the first to be chosen for the pilot program, and the response has been overwhelmingly positive. Thank you, Metro!
